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Dates in History

- 1620 Jean Picard, French astronomer first accurately measured the length of a degree of a meridian (longitude line) and from that computed the size of the Earth on July 21, 1620. His measurement of the Earth was used by Sir Isaac Newton to verify his theory of gravitation. In 1675 Picard made the first recorded observation of barometric light, the light that appears in the vacuum above the mercury in a barometer when the barometer is moved about.
- **1804** On July 11, 1804 a duel was fought between prominent American politicians Aaron Burr, the sitting Vice President of the United States, and Alexander Hamilton, the former Secretary of the Treasury, at Weehawken, New Jersey. Tensions reached a boiling point with Hamilton's journalistic defamation of Burr's character during the 1804 New York gubernatorial race, in which Burr was a candidate. Although Hamilton fired the first shot, Burr responded with improved aim and Hamilton died the following day.
- **1843** On July 2, 1843, after a powerful storm, residents of Charleston, South Carolina, came face to teeth with an alligator standing on the corner of Wentworth and Anson, a narrow one-way street on the east side of Charleston near the French Quarter. Editor H. L. Pinckney broke the news in the *Charleston Mercury*.
- **1933** July 30, 1933 The Monopoly board game was copyright registered. Charles Darrow, became the first millionaire game designer after he sold his patent to Parker Brothers.
- **1990** On July 11, 1990, Bill Atkinson, the inventor of HyperCard software, left Apple Computers along with Andy Hertzfeld, coinventor of the Apple Macintosh, and started a new company called General Magic.
