## On the Lighter Side

1777
On June 14th, the Continental Congress adopted a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be thirteen alternate stripes, red and white" and that "the Union be thirteen stars, white, in a blue field, representing a new Constellation." The national flag, which became known as the "Stars and Stripes," was based on the "Grand Union" flag, a banner carried by the Continental Army in 1776 that also consisted of 13 red and white stripes.
1884 On June 16th, the first roller coaster in America opened at Coney Island, in Brooklyn, New York. Known as a switchback railway, it was the brainchild of LaMarcus Thompson and traveled approximately 6 miles per hour and cost a nickel to ride.

1885 On June 17th, the dismantled Statue of Liberty, a gift of friendship from the people of France to the people of America, arrived in New York Harbor after being shipped across the Atlantic Ocean in 350 individual pieces packed in more than 200 cases. The copper and iron statue was reassembled and dedicated the following year in a ceremony presided over by U.S. President Grover Cleveland.

1944
On June 22nd, U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the G.I. Bill, an unprecedented act of legislation designed to compensate returning members of the armed services for their efforts in World War II.

On June 29th, the American spaceshuttle Atlantis docked with the Russian space station Mir to form the largest man-made satellite ever to orbit the earth.
