Memorial Day is sometimes confused with Veterans Day. However, Veterans Day honors all United States military veterans, while Memorial Day honors the soldiers who died while serving.

Approximately 620,000 soldiers on both sides died during the Civil War.

The Grand Army of the Republic was created by the Union Army to honor their dead. After World War I the American Legion took over their duties.

Congress passed the National Moment of Remembrance Act in 2000 that requires all Americans to stop what they are doing at 3:00 pm on Memorial Day to remember and honor those who have died serving the United States.

On Memorial Day, the flag is supposed to be flown at half-mast until noon and then raised to full mast until sunset.

The tradition of wearing red poppies on Memorial Day originated from John McCrae's 1915 poem "In Flanders Fields." Canadians wear red poppies on Remembrance Day in November to honor their soldiers.

It's common for volunteers to place the American flag on graves in the national cemeteries. Memorial Day is also a popular day for people to visit cemeteries and honor those who have died while serving in the military.

In some areas of the rural South, certain cemeteries may hold a Decoration Day event for Memorial Day.

In 1966, President Johnson named Waterloo, New York, as the original place of Memorial Day.

There are more than 300,000 fallen soldiers buried at Arlington Cemetery. On average, 28 burials are held there each day.

Although not as popular today, one Memorial Day tradition was to eat a picnic meal while sitting on the grounds of a cemetery.

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- 1639 The first free, taxpayer-supported public school in North America, the Mather School, was opened in Dorchester, Massachusetts, on May 8th. The school is still open and currently serves 616 students.
- 1707 The "Acts of Union" were two Acts of Parliament: the Union with Scotland Act passed in 1706 by the Parliament of England, and the Union with England Act passed in 1707 by the Parliament of Scotland. The Acts took effect on May 1st. On this date, the Scottish Parliament and the English Parliament united to form the Parliament of Great Britain, based in the Palace of Westminster in London, the home of the English Parliament. The Acts are referred to as the "Union of the Parliaments."
- The first U.S. government-produced postcard was issued on May 1st. One side of the postcard was for a message and the other side was for the recipient's address. By law, the government postcards were the only postcards allowed to bear the term "Postal Card."

 Private publishers were still allowed to print postcards, but they were more expensive to mail than the government-produced cards (2¢ instead of 1¢).
- 1915 On May 7th, less than a year after World War I (1914-18) erupted across Europe, a German U-boat torpedoed and sank the RMS Lusitania, a British ocean liner en route from New York to Liverpool, England. The vessel went down in 20 minutes drowning 1,198 of its 1,959 passengers.
- 1933 On May 8th, the first police radio system, connecting headquarters to patrol cars and patrols cars to one another, was installed in Eastchester Township, New York.
