Ancient Aztec Technology

Farming

Since their capital was built upon an island in the middle of a lake, the Aztecs developed a system to create their own farmland. By using reed mats placed on the water, the Aztecs were able to create man made islands where they were able to cultivate their food. These small islands were called "*chinampa's*"; mud was placed upon them to plant the crops and the roots of the plants would grow to the bottom of the lake.

Medicine

Aztec doctors used a variety of remedies to help heal their citizens. They used splints for broken bones, used crushed obsidian (natural occuring glass) on cuts, preferred fresh dew in the nostrils to combat colds and suggested steam baths for fevers to sweat out evil spirits.

Calendar

The Aztecs used two calendars during their time one used for religious festivals and the other to measure time. The time-measuring calendar recommended the best time to plant crops while the religious calendar advised when to consult the gods. The time calendar had 365 days divided into 18 months. Each month had 20 days, with 5 days at the end of the year for potential disasters and bad luck. The religious calendar had a 260 day cycle, called the "count of days."
